Since members voted down the employer's offer in October, the Canadian **Blood Services – Local 200** Bargaining Committee has been working to get back to the table. The key sticking point remains the employer's refusal to discuss wages until the Bill 29 representation votes are complete. The Committee met this month to discuss strategy for resolving this unfair and unnecessary delay. Negotiations are scheduled to resume Feb. 5, 2019.

MGEU WON'T BE BULLIED BY PREMIER'S REMARKS

On Nov. 4, in response to Premier Pallister's accusations that the MGEU spends too much on government "attack" adds, I told the **Wpg Free Press** that our campaigns simply call on him to keep the election commitment he made: to protect public services and the people who deliver them.

MGAS: DOCS VOICE OPPOSITION TO PRIVATIZATION In early Nov., I told the CBC, Global, and Wpg Free Press that a letter from 16 Lifeflight doctors urging against privatization reinforces what the union has been saying for months now selling off our emergency air ambulance service is short-sighted and risky.

MEMBERS MORE AT RISK IN REMAND DUE TO METH On Nov. 18, I told the National Post, Wpg Free Press, CBC, and Global that the union has requested more training for our members at the Remand Centre dealing with increasing violence of methamphetamine users.

MYC MOVE: INCLUDE MEMBERS IN DISCUSSIONS On Nov. 22, I told the Winnipeg Sun that if the Justice Minister and the City are

rejected a final offer earlier in the fall, citing employment security and instructor workload as outstanding issues.

Meanwhile, the Université de Saint **Boniface** Bargaining Committee moved on to talks at the Common Benefits Table for Locals 147, 148, 149 this month, and bargaining dates for University College of the North - Locals 69 and 70 are being scheduled into the new year.

RATIFICATION REVIEW

Members of Teranet - Locals 397 and 399, who administer all land titles within Manitoba, ratified a four-year agreement that included increases to wages and the health spending account, while members of Impark - Local 199 ratified a five-year contract that includes increases to wages and midnight shift premiums. Customer Service reps will also be rolled into the agreement, meaning they'll enjoy many of the same protections as Lot Attendants.
