AT THE BARGAINING TABLE

WITH POSTAL STRIKE, E-MAIL COMMUNICATION BECOMES KEY



In solidarity with the Cdn Union of Postal Workers, the MGEU has not been posting any mail over the last few weeks. That means meeting notices for bargaining proposal and ratification meetings have been going out

via email or postings in workplaces. As long as the strike continues, we ask all members who receive an emailed meeting notice to:

- mention when and where the meeting is taking place to co-workers who may not have received the email;
- forward the email to co-workers who may not be in the MGEU database.

Together, we can ensure everyone has a say in their new collective agreement!

In the Public Eye

CUTS TO CIVIL SERVICE HURT US ALL

On Oct. 1, in response to the Civil Service Commission annual report showing government had already reduced the size of Manitoba's civil service by 1,100 positions, I told the **Wpg Free Press** that this is no surprise to us. For months, MGEU members throughout the province have been pointing out ways vital services are suffering due to staff shortages.

SHERIFFS: DIALOGUE NEEDED TO ADDRESS RISKS

On Oct. 2, I told the **CBC** that a risk assessment report put together by sheriffs from across the province should be evaluated before any changes are made. The report, which outlined a number of safety concerns, must lead to a re-opening of dialogue with the employer, the members and the union because talking about security

solutions in public can undermine their effectiveness.

METH CRISIS: GOV MUST ADDRESS SECURITY NOW

After CBC released video of a patient attacking three security officers and a nurse, I told the **Wpg Free Press**, **Global**, and **CBC**, that given the increasing risks, security personnel must be trained and equipped with peace officer status ASAP.

On Oct. 18, I told the **CBC** that hiring a hospital security officer without clarifying when and how that officer can step in to confront dangerous situations does little to address safety in our hospitals.

BRANDON SUN GIVES MGEU ELECTIONS SOME INK

On Oct. 24, the **Brandon Sun** spoke with Charlotte McWilliams and Doug Troke, our two newly-elected MGEU vice-presidents from Westman, and allowed me as president to reiterate our union's steadfast commitment to protect the public services we all count on.

BUDGET 2019: TIME TO KEEP ELECTION PROMISES

On Oct. 25, I was joined by fellow MGEU members to present our union's recommendations for the 2019 Provincial budget.

We reminded government that when asked their preference – tax cuts or services – Manitobans choose public services. That's also what Premier Pallister promised in the 2016 election: to protect services and the people who provide them. In 2019, it's time to halt the cuts and do what Manitobans elected them to do.
