SOLID FINANCIAL FOOTING

The MGEU remained in a strong financial position in 2019, while members' dues, at 1.25% on all income, continue to be amongst the lowest in Canada.

The MGEU Policy Manual requires certain amounts to be transferred to internally restricted funds, such as the Defense and Contingency Funds. This year, \$1 million of the excess of revenues over operating expenses was transferred into the Defense Fund to strengthen the MGEU's financial position for potential future challenges (such as strikes).

includes member and elected workplace rep training, and communication with members.





MGEU 2019 YEAR-IN-REVIEW we went beyond the bargaining table to fight for your rights

The Challenge

Last year proved to be exceptionally tough at the bargaining table for most MGEU members, largely due to the government's heavy-handed wage freeze legislation, otherwise known as Bill 28.



In July, after the Province refused to discuss wages and benefits with the Civil Service Bargaining Committee, we filed for arbitration and began working to prepare arguments on behalf of over 12,000 members.

Not long after, the government told us they would not appoint an arbitration panel. As a result, we'll be taking the Province to court in the new year, arguing that such a refusal denies Civil Service members their right, under the Civil Service Act, to have an independent third-party panel hear from both sides and then determine a fair outcome.



Our Day in Court

In late November, the Partnership to Defend Public Services (which includes the MB Federation of Labour, the MGEU, and other public sector unions) finally had the opportunity to challenge the constitutionality of Bill 28, arguing that the government's heavy-handed wage freeze legislation denies our members their Charter right to bargain in good faith with their employer. The trial will continue into 2020.

WE MADE SURE MANITOBANS UNDERSTAND THE COST OF CUTS AND PRIVATIZATION





• Throughout the summer of 2019, you couldn't miss our Care Comes First campaign, where billboards, transit and radio ads gave voice to our members', and Manitobans', concerns that the Pallister government's cuts and privatization are compromising health care.

WE GAVE VOICE TO THE ISSUES IMPACTING YOU MOST ON THE JOB

• In response to the thefts and security crisis in our Liquor Marts this year, we pushed hard for safety protocols through ongoing meetings with the employer, including a day of lobbying MLAs on November 28, and repeated calls for action in the media.



 On behalf of thousands of MGEU members — from Paramedics to Manitoba Housing workers, Correctional Officers to Youth Crisis Workers — who are facing increased amounts of violence on a daily basis, we called for immediate action to address Manitoba's meth crisis through a series of web and media articles.



- After months of calling on employers and the government to empower security officers with elevated legal status and exercise their authority appropriately, we welcomed the government's introduction of *Bill 17: The Police Services Amendment Act* in March.
- Early in 2019, after a number of violent incidents at Employment and Income Assistance offices in Winnipeg, we called on the government to review the safety measures currently in place and provide physical design improvements to the workplace, while enhancing training opportunities for our members.

WE STROVE TO ENSURE AS MANY MANITOBANS AS POSSIBLE ENJOY MGEU SUPPORTS AND PROTECTIONS



 In February, we launched People Behind the Public, a television and online ad campaign aimed at reminding Manitobans that public services keep our province healthy, safe and strong — but they don't happen without the people who deliver them. Keep an eye out for a reboot in early 2020!



 In June, we re-launched Keeping Liquor Public, a radio and online ad campaign outlining how our public Liquor Marts balance great selection, competitive pricing and social responsibilities. KeepingLiquorPublic.ca includes images you can share on social media to help spread the word.



• Later in June, after the Minister of Health made comments suggesting Selkirk Laundry Services would be closed, we rallied outside MLA Dr. Alan Lagimodiere's office to demand some answers on behalf of our more than forty members who work at the facility.



- All year long, we spoke out strongly and repeatedly against cuts and closures across the province, ensuring Manitobans understood what was at stake when the government:
 - Cut jobs at MB Agricultural Services Corp.
 - Contracted out the Real





- Throughout the year, and especially during the summer campaign period, MGEU members and staff worked tirelessly across the province on the Bill 29 health care union representation votes. We will soon be welcoming new members from the successful votes and it's with heavy hearts that we're also now saying goodbye to some longstanding and deeply committed MGEU activists and many members who work in health care.
- We continued to organize new Locals, such as Patient Transport Services – Local 451 and Macdonald Youth Services Coach Program – Local 453. The MGEU now represents more members working in Child and Family Services than any other union in the province.
